



Children and Cities

Three urbanization issues require response for better planning, financing and governance for children, in accordance with the 17 goals of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development:








Urban Systems Influence Children's Behaviours


A well-planned city plays a critical role in shaping the growth of a child. There are a range of entry points for children to interact with urban resource systems such as transportation, nature, water and sanitation, food, energy and data. These urban systems function within the larger scale of the city and city-region, spread out in the urban-rural continuum, and have direct influence on children's behaviours.



Child-Friendly City Concept

A child-friendly city is a city, town, municipality or any system of local governance committed to fulfilling child rights as articulated in the Convention on the Rights of the Child.

It is a city or municipality where the **VOICES**, **NEEDS**, **PRIORITIES AND RIGHTS OF CHILDREN** are an integral part of public policies, programmes, and decisions. **Thus**, a child-friendly city is a city that is fit for all.



Investing in Urban Planning, Investing in Children

The challenges of urbanization and the need for equity-based, process-oriented and people-centred urban planning require investments in the profession, in terms of capacity building and training. This, in turn, requires that existing practices in urban planning need to be strengthened and outdated regulations or standards have to be enhanced.

To plan child-responsive urban settings is not a matter of inventing new tools, but fine-tuning and adjusting existing instruments, strategies and methods to focus on children.


